Description

Duration

120 minutes (3 days)

Objectives

At the end of the activities, the pupils are expected to:

- identify facts/opinions in a selection read
- give opinions about information read
- differentiate a fact from an opinion.

Preparation

Conduct the pretest to find out if the pupils have acquired the skill in determining statements that express facts or opinions.

Procedures

A. Instuctional Posters 1-5

- 1. Divide the class into five groups.
- 2. Provide each group with a specific poster.
- 3. Using the manila paper, allow ample time for each group to complete the task as instructed on the posters.
- 4. Have the reporter of each group present or publish the poster with the answers.
- 5. Facilitate peer checking after all works have been





B. F or O Bonus Game

- Give each member of the group the F or O Bonus Game card.
- 2. Set a time allocation for each group to play.
- 3. Supervise checking of answers.
- 4. The group without errors wins.
- Besides playing in groups, the F or O Bonus Game can be played individually or by pairs.
- It is important to note that players can only earn points when the shaded small boxes follow the answer key pattern.

Teaching Hints

- The skill on determining fact and opinion is undeniably confusing especially if taught for the first time. It is therefore necessary to conduct a pretest to find out if the pupils have acquired the skill. This could serve as a springboard for a comprehensive elaboration of the skill through the exercises provided.
- The fact and opinion information sheet can be used to supplement further explanations on what facts and opinions are.

Remember:

A reader evaluates the material he/she reads when he/she decides if:

- the sentence is a fact or opinion
- the story tells a fantasy or reality
- the sentence is not supported by evidences
- the sentence tells truth or falsity.

Evaluation

The success of using this material will be measured by:

- observation of pupils' active participation in distinguishing facts from opinions using the instructional posters
- achievement of 100% accurate answers of the F or O Bonus Game.



Opinion - is a statement that tells what someone thinks or believes and cannot be proven. A valid opinion is based upon reason and evidence and is supported by facts. A biased opinion is based only upon emotions. So me opinion signal words are I think, I believe, it seems, always, never, probably, most likely, perhaps, may, possibly, most, all and should.




